## Four Good Reasons Not to Read the Bible Literally

*Or: Lutheran Notes for Your Summer Reading*

A statistic stopped me in my tracks recently. About three in ten Americans read the Bible literally. That is, they read it as if it were a history textbook or a science manual or a piece of investigative journalism that happens to involve a lot of beards.

Lutherans, generally speaking, don't read the Bible that way. And summer, when many of you might actually pick up your Bible alongside a beach read or a back-porch novel, seems like a good time to say why.

Because here's the thing. Somewhere along the way, *literal* became shorthand for *serious*. As if the only way to take the Bible seriously is to read it like a court transcript. As if Christians who don't read every story that way are somehow softer, sneakier, or less faithful.

I don't think that's right. In fact, I think it's almost exactly backwards. Karl Barth, arguably the greatest theologian of the twentieth century, once said, "*I take the Bible too seriously to read it literally.*" Let me offer four reasons why he, and most Christians across most of history, would have said the same.

### 1. The Bible Does Not Claim to Be Inerrant.

This may come as a surprise, but it's true. Nowhere in its 30,000+ verses does the Bible claim to be factually inerrant. That is, free of error in matters of history, science, or geography. *Inerrant* isn't a word the Bible uses about itself. It isn't a word the church used about itself for most of its history, either. It was coined in the middle of the 19th century, largely as a defensive counter-move against the increased practice of reading the Bible in its historical context.

The verse literalists most often point to is 2 Timothy 3:16: "*All scripture is inspired by God and is useful for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness.*" Notice what it says, and what it doesn't. Scripture is *inspired*. It is *useful*. Nothing about being a science textbook.

We use the word *inspired* all the time. We use it to describe a painting, a Chopin sonata, a sermon (one hopes). What ties the wild, sprawling, sixty-six-book library of the Bible together may be precisely that. Each book is written out of its author's inspired encounter with the living God.

## **2. Reading the Bible Literally Actually Distorts Its Witness.**

The four Gospels tell the story of Jesus with shared bones and different fingerprints. Matthew, Mark, and Luke put Jesus' clearing of the Temple near the end of his ministry. John puts it right at the beginning. Faced with that difference, literal readers usually do one of two things. They panic and conclude the Bible isn't trustworthy, or they perform some impressive theological gymnastics, deciding, for example, that Jesus must have chased the moneychangers out *twice*, an event none of the Gospels actually record.

Both moves assume that what the Gospel writers were really after was journalism. But Lutherans tend to think the biblical authors weren't filing copy for the morning paper. They were *confessing their faith*. So when John tells the Temple story differently, the question isn't "who got it right?" It's "what is John trying to tell us?" In this case: that Jesus is the new Passover Lamb (John 1:36), and once his ministry begins, the whole system of Temple sacrifice is already on its way out.

That's not a mistake to be reconciled. That's a clue worth following.

## **3. Most Christians, Across Most of History, Didn't Read It Literally Either.**

St. Augustine, one of the towering minds of the early church, almost didn't become a Christian because he assumed he had to believe Jonah was literally inside a literal whale for literally three days. It was Ambrose, the bishop of Milan, who introduced him to the possibility of reading biblical stories metaphorically and theologically. Only then could Augustine take the Bible (and the Christians who read it) seriously.

Martin Luther put it this way. The central purpose of the Bible is not to give us a history lesson but to "drive Christ." That is, to set before us, again and again, the truth that God's love is most clearly revealed in Jesus.

The notion that *true* must mean "factually accurate in every detail" is largely a post-Enlightenment idea. For most of Christian history, *true* meant something deeper, bigger, and longer-lasting. The truth of Christ raised from the dead, for instance, is not a smaller truth than the truth of two plus two. It is an infinitely bigger one.

## **4. A Literal Bible Quietly Undermines What the Bible Says About God.**

Read the Bible for any length of time and you'll notice something. Most of the heroes are a mess. Abraham passes his wife off as his sister, *twice*, to save his own skin. Moses is a murderer. David sleeps around. Peter denies Jesus three times before the rooster has even finished its coffee. The "heroes of the faith," almost without exception, are complicated people with feet of clay.

And that, beloved, is the *point*. The God of the Bible regularly uses ordinary, flawed, sometimes spectacularly broken people to accomplish extraordinary things. The Apostle Paul calls us "jars of clay" carrying an extraordinary treasure (2 Cor. 4:7). Read the Bible as a flat, supernatural, otherworldly document, and you quietly turn it into the opposite of what it claims to be. It becomes a record of magic, rather than the messy, miraculous story of God working through people who look an awful lot like us.

Including, of course, you and me.

## Four Things to Pack with the Bible This Summer

So if your summer reading pile includes the Bible (and I hope it does), pack these four things alongside it:

- *Truth is bigger than fact.*
- *Differences in the stories aren't bugs; they're features.*
- *God uses ordinary, flawed people (including the one holding this newsletter) to do extraordinary things.*
- *Reading the Bible takes us deeper, not flatter.*

Happy reading. Take your time. Argue with it. Underline it. Get confused by it. Let it confuse you. The Bible wasn't given to us to be a coffee-table coaster of indisputable facts. It was given, as Luther said, to *drive Christ* into our hearts, our questions, our summer afternoons, and our ordinary, jar-of-clay lives.

And of course... I'll see you in Church!

## *“Is there room for me?”*

That’s a question people might ask when they’ve been invited to a popular venue. Sometimes a concert has standing room only. I remember being invited to a professional basketball game. What the person didn’t tell me was that we had “Standing Room” tickets. Which meant no seat! So we wandered around behind the rows of people who had seats to find a place where we could see the court.

## *“Is there a place for me?”*

This version of the question might be asked when they’ve been invited to join a group or a club. Sometimes a group just wants numbers but doesn’t actually want a person to be themselves and offer their “*opinion*,” “*contribution*” or anything more than just showing up. I was asked once to be on a board simply to fill a slot, but it was clear everyone had a role to play except me. I wasn’t actually sure why I was invited because there was no “*place*” for someone like me.

## *“Is there a place for me?”*

These questions could be addressed to a congregation, a community of faith, even a small group within a congregation. Do we have enough “*room*” for people to join us in worship, in a study group, in an activity or service? Do we expect people to join us and are we ready to both welcome **AND** incorporate them? Are we willing to have people bring their whole selves, their participation, their opinions, their history and perspectives, their commitments and innovations? Are we ready to be “*different*” than we used to be because that someone new is joining us?

I think of the disciples who first followed Jesus. It seems to me Jesus chose them for their differences as much as what they might have had in common. Jesus seemed to relish in bringing this diverse group of followers together. We know some of them were devote and devotedly religious. We also know some of them were “outsiders.” (*Think Matthew, previously a tax collector*) We know at least one of them was of a radical opinion and life style. (*Think Simon, the zealot*) We know some of them had “*issues*” which were hard to overcome. (*Think Mary, from whom Jesus drove out demons which had troubled her*). Still, with Jesus there was not only “*room enough*” for each of them and all of them. With Jesus, there was a “*place for each of them and all of them*”.

Think about Trinity Church. There is room for you.

Think about Trinity Church. What is your place in this community of believers?

Think about someone who you might invite to join us here. Can you imagine enough room for them? Can you imagine a place for them? If so, welcome them to join us here!

## **President's Report—Jeff Haferkamp**

- **Cleanup activities.** An ad hoc committee is organizing ground cleanup. Mike Sharitz will keep a list of volunteers for short-notice work and two major clean ups are planned for the spring and fall.
- **Program review.** The next Annual Key Program review will be at the June meeting when we will invite Christy Cole to discuss the Preschool.
- **Solar scoping.** The church is exploring whether rooftop solar could pay for itself.
- **Strategic plan intro.** See Pastor's Report.

## **Pastor's Report—Pastor Chris**

- **Strategic plan status.** The plan grew out of Pastor's Lenten discernment and discussions with the staff and several members. Staff responded positively. Council members are asked to read and give feedback; fall listening sessions with the congregation are planned, with the goal of a finalized, fully transparent plan by year-end.
- **Preschool survey.** Christy Cole's annual parent survey was distributed to the council; results were very positive.
- **Dinner Groups.** Building on the strategic-plan discussion, the council will restart dinner groups, intentionally including preschool families, with a possible launch this fall.
- **Livestream issue.** Wirecast is malfunctioning, disrupting live streaming. A proposed fix is hopeful by Thursday.
- **Facilities/Synod.** No water leaks after current rains! Synod assembly is June 6.

## **Treasurer's Report—Mike Hower**

- Mike Hower presented the April treasurer's report showing Trinity in good financial condition.

## **Youth Program Update—Rebecca Henderson**

- Rebecca Henderson reported on the relaunched youth program with the goal of one event per month, expanding participation and building relationships before instruction.
- Council is strongly encouraging investing more in the youth program and open to increasing the budget as needed.

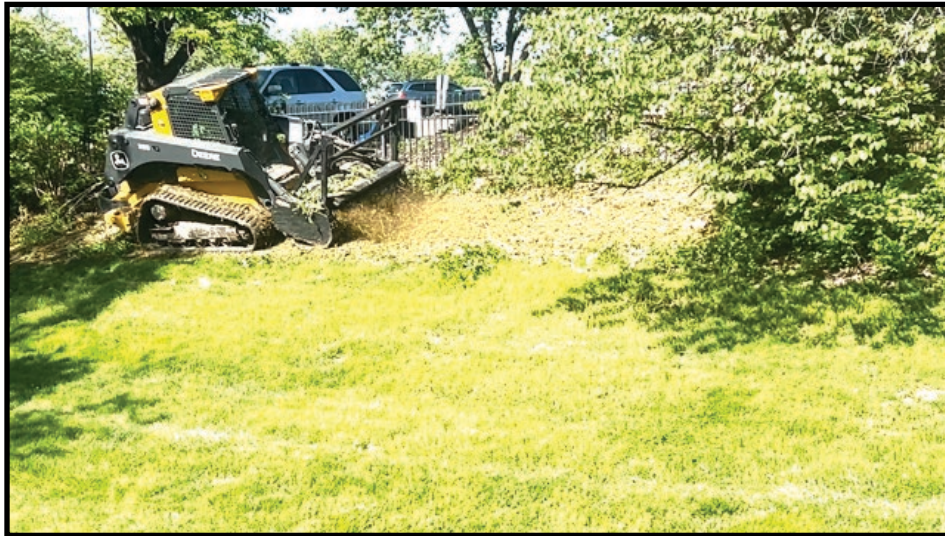
# FACILITY REPORT
